MESSAGE FROM PASTOR

Walls

Walls are a feature of Jerusalem. If you walked any distance on just about any street, you would find walls on either side of you. In the Old City (and in some buildings outside the Old City) many of the walls are the outsides of the buildings. This city had learned over the centuries that it must protect itself from the outside world. It was learned that it must build walls and make its buildings out of stone with narrow entrances and metal shuttered windows , to keep out enemies. The history of Jerusalem is one of conquest from without and turmoil from within. This city has been conquered at least 15 times. In each of these conquests parts or the entire city were destroyed. The Romans did the best job of destruction in 66 CE. People had to protect themselves from not only invaders but from the hate of neighbors that might destroy their homes and businesses. An inner courtyard is also a common feature of the city. People learned how to protect themselves from danger from without, yet they still needed to have a peaceful place to live. The courtyard is surrounded by a wall so you cannot see the outside and this gives the homeowner a feeling of safety and peace. The courtyard is usually made to look like a garden. The more we are afraid of the outside world the more we try to make the inside world safe. If our church was just outside of the Old City, it would have been built with an 8–10-foot wall surrounding the whole property. It would have had large iron gates placed at the entrance to the parking lot and any other entrance. Future renovation projects would be to reinforce the walls and beautify the inside of the property. Walls (and gates) are an effort to separate the holy from the profane. A gate is the transition point from the outside to the inside--from the secular to the sacred. Ideally the whole city of Jerusalem was to be a holy place, so a wall was built around it to separate it from the rest of the world. As the reality of the city was seen as less than holy, sections were walled off and called holy. Officially the city had one sacred section- the Temple Mount. Unofficially (at Jesus' time) groups in and outside of the city claimed that their area was sacred because they practiced the Law (in their opinion) correctly. The Essenes and the Qumran community are good examples of groups living separate from the rest of the people. The Temple Mount is built with separate sections, each one is more holy than the other. To even go up to the Temple mount one had to take a ritual bath to wash off the outside and be "clean." When you were clean you could ascend the stairs into the court of the Gentiles, to which any could go. Women could go closer to the Temple itself as far as the court of women. Israelites, Priest, and Levites could go closer to the temple into the court of the priests. Finally, the Holy of Holies to which only the High Priests could go. The Temple mount itself is an example of trying to make something holy by making it exclusive. Walls did provide some safety and were built by various kings throughout Jerusalem's history. The walls around Jerusalem in 66 CE enabled the city to hold out for three years against the Romans. The Romans destroyed the walls around the city and the Temple to prevent Jerusalem being used as a fortress. The current city wall was built by Suleiman around the Old City in the 1500's. Many of the churches walled off their property because there were times when invaders destroyed churches. While it is true the walls were needed for protection yet now it makes the churches uninviting. The church of the Nativity in Bethlehem has a very small entry door so that no one can ride a horse through the door—it's practical but so uninviting. I even have to duck going in the door. Jesus came to Jerusalem with a bold and unwelcome idea; the holy did not have to do

with a place but with the attitude and the action of loving. Jesus challenges people to reject fear as the primary force that affects their life. Jesus wants us to take down the wall of fear (and hate) and live in the world. Jesus wants us to make places sacred not by separating but by reconciling people to God and one another. We still need time to rest and feel safe (part of the reason of the Sabbath is a time set aside for peace), but we do not need to build a structure (either physical or psychological) to rest in that shuts out the outside world. In this time of Pentecost ask God to reveal to you all of the walls you have built and then to help you take them down. We were not made to live in fear of what might happen. We cannot live in fear of sending our children off to school; we cannot live in fear of losing our jobs, our retirement not being enough or of getting sick. We need to prepare for all these things but things that are out of our control we have to let go. If we live in fear, we will miss some blessing that is coming our way because we are in some pseudo-safe place behind a wall. One of the most meaningful churches in the holy land is on the Mt. of Beatitudes. It is a shrine church that is built in a round shape. There are four windows just at the height of a person. Each window looks in a different direction. Each window is very wide so one can see the entire outside world. The windows are to remind those on the inside that Christ had His message for the world and the world should be in view when we are in worship. Walls can keep us safe for a while, but Christ can make us safe for eternity.
